#### **Committee Member Recruitment**

The Municipality of Brockton is currently recruiting for Committee members on the Accessibility Advisory Committee, Elmwood Community Centre Board, and Hanover/Walkerton Waste Management Committee!

The Accessibility Advisory Committee is responsible for making recommendations to Council that considers the needs and rights of persons with disabilities and assures maximum integrated accessibility for all citizens. The Accessibility Advisory Committee will fulfill the requirements of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 by providing vision and advice to the Council of the Municipality of Brockton to create an accessible and inclusive community. The Municipality seeks to gather the experience of individuals with a disability as members on the Accessibility Advisory Committee. # **Animal Control - Dog Tags**

The Municipality of Brockton is mailing dog tag invoices in January 2023. Invoices are based on dog owner information in our current database, and your dog will continue to wear the permanent tag you received previously. Dog tags can be purchased at the Municipal Office (100 Scott St, Walkerton). The Municipality requires all dog owners to license their dogs within one week of the dog coming into their care. If you no longer own a dog, need a replacement tag, or need to register your dog, contact the Municipal Office at 519-881-2223, or email the Municipal Office so we can update our records.

#### South Bruce O.P.P. Detachment - March is Fraud Prevention Month

Each year, the South Bruce OPP participates in Fraud Prevention Month in an effort to help raise awareness on fraud. Remember that the goal is to get your money. The scammer will try to confuse you, intimidate you, feign affection for you, all in an effort to take your money. There is really no limit to the type of cons and scams a Tech-savvy con artist can create, so the South Bruce OPP is asking you to be mindful of fraud every day, as there are millions of cons and scams are attempted **every day**. With that in mind, here is some information on 2 common types of scams: the Emergency scam and the Romance scam.

#### By the numbers

In 2022, the CAFC received fraud reports totalling a staggering \$530 million in victim losses. This was nearly a 40 per cent increase from the 2021 unprecedented \$380 million in losses.

#### **Emergency Scam**

Fraudster's target anyone and everyone, particularly the vulnerable and seniors. In 2022, more than \$9.2 million was reported lost to emergency scams, according to the CAFC. This was a drastic increase from \$2.4 million in 2021.

# What is an emergency scam?

Emergency scams, including variations called "grandparent scams", use urgency and the manipulation of emotions to extort money from victims. In these scams, fraudsters cold call seniors, on landline phones, claiming to be a grandchild, family member, law enforcement officer or lawyer calling on behalf of their loved one. They'll say that the person's loved one was involved in an emergency, such as a collision, charged by law enforcement, legal peril, being sick or injured, etc. They demand the senior provide payment immediately for supposed bail, legal fees, fines or other amounts "owed" to stop the family member from going to jail or to get them released from custody. This is a scam.

The fraudsters isolate the victims by informing them that there is a court-imposed gag order, and they're forbidden from discussing the matter. The victims are directed to attend their financial institution to withdraw the requested amount in cash. The fraudsters will then send someone to pick it up from the victim's home or have the victim send the money via courier services. There have also been reports of victims paying with cryptocurrency.

#### Romance Scam

According to the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC), Canadian romance fraud victims reported losing over \$59 million to fraudsters in 2022. Ontario victims represented over \$20 million of those losses.

#### What is a romance scam?

Romance fraudsters prey on victims looking for a partner, companion or love interest. In this digital world, scammers use technology to convince victims to enter into a virtual or online relationship, to gain a victims" trust and affection. This can occur through: e-mail messages, popular encrypted chat applications, online chat groups, fake profiles on social media, dating sites or even through online platforms where likeminded people hangout online.

#### South Bruce O.P.P. Detachment – March is Fraud Prevention Month (Continued)

A new trend has the fraudsters sending random text messages to victims. The messages often read "where are you?", "where have you been?" or something similar. Once the victim responds, a conversation is started, and the fraudster attempts to build a relationship with the victim.

Eventually the scammer asks for money for travel, a medical emergency or assistance with a family emergency or convince the victim to invest into a fraudulent cryptocurrency platform. Remember...there is always urgency and associated drama like an old soap opera. The scammers might also ask you to receive money and transfer the funds elsewhere, or purchase items and send them to foreign countries. The scammer always makes excuses for not being able to meet in person, travel to see you, or use video conferencing to talk. Remember if is seems too good to be true, it often is!

#### How to protect yourself?

- Don't give out your personal information (name, address, DOB, SIN, banking credentials).
- Don't accept friend requests from people you do not know.
- Don't invest your money in platforms provided by people you don't know.
- Be careful who you share images with. Suspects will often use explicit pictures to extort victims into sending more money.
- Protect your online accounts.
- Never send money to someone you haven't met.
- Don't respond to text messages from phone numbers you do not recognize.
- Always verify an unsolicited contact before you consider responding.

If you fall victim to a fraud or know someone who has, contact your local police service to report the crime and report it to the CAFC at **1-888-495-8501** or online on the **Fraud Reporting System (FRS)**, even if a financial loss did not occur.









The popularity of electric bikes and electric scooters (e-bikes and e-scooters) has taken off over the past few years. Lithium-ion batteries are usually the source of power for both, and if not used correctly, or if damaged, those batteries can catch on fire or explode. Whether you use e-bikes or e-scooters as your main way of getting around, or just for fun, there are important safety tips to keep in mind when charging or storing these devices.

#### The Problem

- Damaged or defective batteries can overheat, catch fire, or explode.
- Lithium-ion battery fires give off toxic gases and they burn extremely hot.

# **Safety Tips**

- Only purchase and use devices, batteries, and charging equipment that are listed by a nationally recognized testing lab and labeled accordingly.
- Always follow the instructions from the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery and the charger that were designed for, and came with, the device.
- Do not keep charging the device or device battery after it is fully charged.
- Only charge one device or device battery at a time to prevent overloading the circuit.
- Keep batteries at room temperature when possible. Do not charge them at temperatures below 32°F (0°C) or above 105°F (40°C).
- Do not store batteries in direct sunlight or inside hot vehicles, and keep them away from children and liquids.

- Store e-bikes, e-scooters, and batteries away from exit doors and anything that can get hot or catch fire.
- Only have device repairs performed by a qualified professional.
- Do not put lithium-ion batteries in the trash. Recycling is always the best option. Take the batteries to a battery recycling location or contact your local waste department for disposal instructions.

# Signs of a Problem

Stop using the e-bike or e-scooter if you notice any of these problems with the battery: unusual odor, change in color, too much heat, change in shape, leaking, smoking, or not keeping a charge.
